LRAPA monitors air quality in Oakridge. The agency has a monitor at the Willamette Activity Center and has installed multiple commercial grade "Purple Air Sensors" throughout Oakridge.

LRAPA issues outdoor burning advisories and **Green**, **Yellow**, **Red** home wood heating days in Oakridge.



Wintertime woodsmoke impacts air quality




Nightly wood stove smoke degrades air quality, as seen in the above sunrise picture.

When the day warms and wood stove use ends, air quality improves.





Home Heating Upgrades



Provide homes with (1) certified woodstoves, (2) weatherization and small home repairs, (3) ductless or ducted heat pumps.



Qualification Questionnaire: +200 homes

Home currently enrolled: 46

Initial Home Energy Audits: 29

Wood Stoves installed: 6

Ductless heat pumps Installed: 12

Homes weatherized: 6

Final Post Audits: 3

Completed Homes: 3

\$15,000 available per home.



Community Firewood Program



Provide community dry seasoned wood to seniors, low-income, and disabled.



This winter 100 cords of wood were delivered to residents.







Community and School Education



Communicate the health impacts of degraded air quality and educate air quality solutions.








Smoke Safety Plan coordination.



Air Filters in Homes and Schools



Provide HEPA air purifiers to the community and fund HVAC retrofits and air filter installs at Oakridge High School, Elementary School, and Oakridge Library.





Over 450 air purifiers distributed throughout Oakridge and Westfir. The program is no longer offering air purifiers, but it is providing annual replacement filters with remaining funds.




Code Enforcment



Provide funding to the City of Oakridge to enforce the city's smoke opacity ordinance and expand the city's education focused diversion program.

This grant funding source provides the Oakridge Police Department with \$71,000 a year for five years.






How old is the program?





Are these efforts improving air quality?



EPA may lower NAAQS standards by 2024.

Historical wood stove changeout and education programs have improved air quality. Oakridge Air will further reduce smoke pollution as more heating upgrades are delivered and installed.


Oakridge-Westfir is in "nonattainment" for exceeding National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) set by the EPA in 2006.

Oakridge has met the standard since 2016. LRAPA has requested the EPA redesignate Oakridge and Westfir as a "maintenance" airshed.

EPA approval expected in May 2022.



Wildfire Impacts on Air Quality



The introduction of PM_{2.5} pollution from wildfires is a growing air quality problem in Oakridge and the entire Pacific Northwest.

LRAPA must create and submit an "exceptional event" report to the EPA for every wildfire NAAQS exceedance, so the data isn't held against Oakridge when determining Oakridge's "nonattainment" status.

Exposure to wildfire smoke emphasizes the need for cleaner wintertime air.

Chimney sweep vouchers, wood moisture meters, and wood stove thermometer provided to the community.

Air quality research projects with UofO and OSU.
